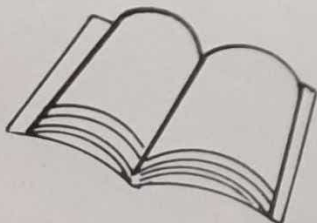
MY FAVOURITY TOY

WHERE DID THE GAME OF BASKETBALL ORIGINATE?

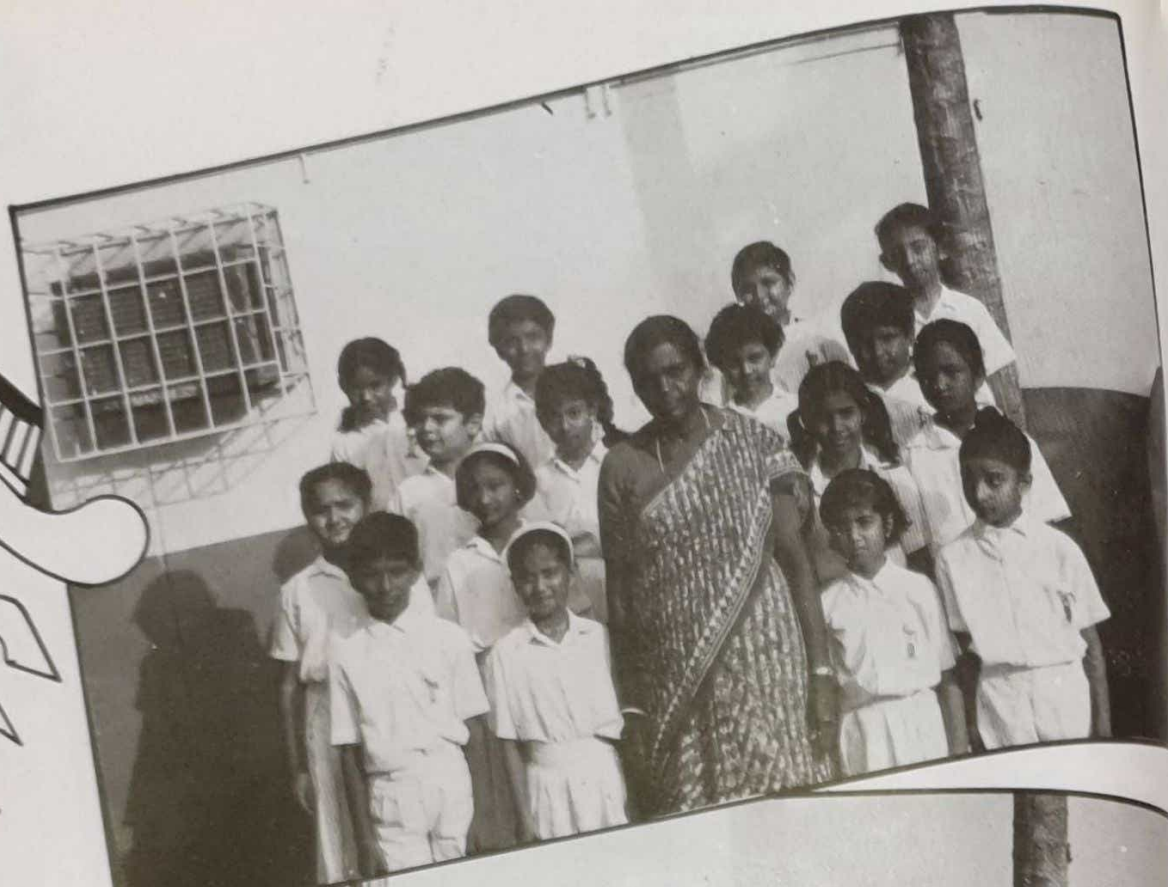

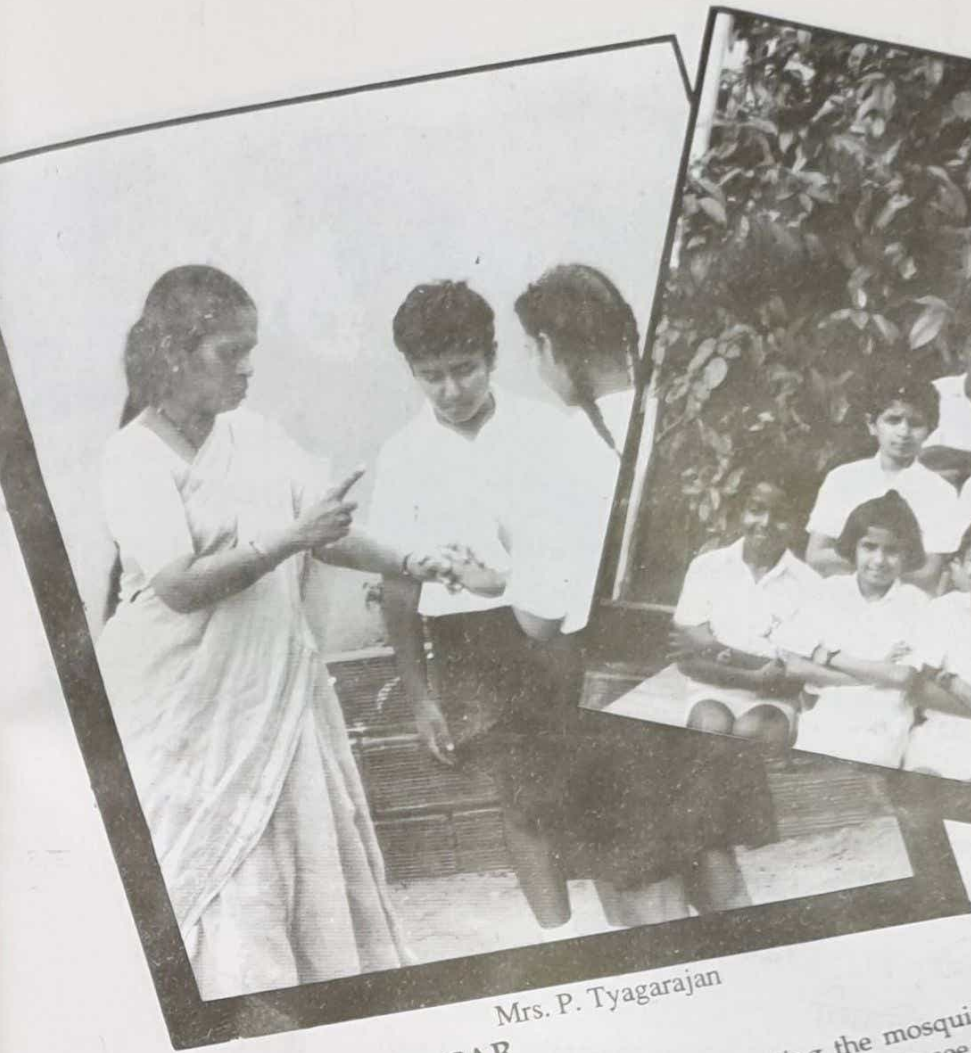


WHO WAS DRACULA?

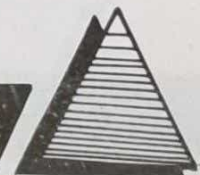

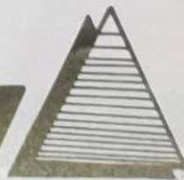
NAPOLEAN - THE HERO OF YESTER YEARS

Napoleon Bonaparte as a French General and an Emperor was unanimously revered in France during his life time. Napoleon was born on the island of Corsica in 1769 which was under the French rule. He was educated at the military academy at Paris and joined the army when he was barely sixteen. His fame spread all over France when he rescued Toulon from British siege. Later he married Josephine de Beauharnas in 1796 and gradually rose to the position of Commander in Chief in the army. Napoleon with strategy defeated Austria which controlled Italy. Thus the whole of Italy lay at his feet. The French army under Napoleon defeated Egypt in the battle of Pyramids. He proclaimed himself an Emperor on December 2nd 1804. He divorced his first wife and married Marie Louise, the daughter of the Austrian Emperor. The most important battle of Napoleon was the 'Battle of Austerlitz' in 1805. By 1810 Napoleon had reached the apogee of his glory. He defeated Russians at the battle of Volga. However, he was forced to retreat because of the terrible Russian winter. This catastrophe heartened the people of

Europ to defy Napoleon. The greatest debacle since Napoleon came to power was 'The Battle of Leipzig' or 'The Battle of Nations'. In 1813 in which 'Grande Armee' was torn to shreds. The Austrians, Prussians and Russians combined their mind and inflicted a crushing defeat. Subsequently he abdicated the throne and was exiled to the island of Elba. He secretly escaped from Elba and raised an army declaring himself an emperor again. The final battle was fought at 'Waterloo' in Belgium. His army was defeated by the British and the Prussian armies led by Nelson and Bluecher respectively. He was again exiled to the island of St. Helena where he died in 1821 at the age of 52.

Napoleon was tolerant and showed respect for human life. One of his remarkable achievements was the 'Code Napoleon'. This code was used for effective administration and political stability. He changed the system of education, opened the Bank of France and instituted 'The Legion of Honour'. Napoleon changed the history of France and the world.

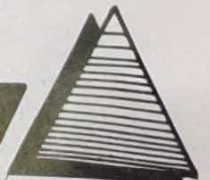
'MY HEART BEATS FOR INDIA'

HOW DO OYSTERS MAKE PEARLS?

Pearls are some of the most beautiful gems we know, and are very expensive to buy. So it may come as something of a surprise to learn that pearls start off as irritating grains of sand and other substances which get into the soft part of the oyster. The oyster is a malleable, which means it has a soft and very sensitive body inside its hinged shell. When a grain of sand or grit gets inside the shell and on to the soft body of the oyster, the creature covers it with layer upon layer of a hard smooth substance called nacre, which makes mother of pearl. It does this to cut down the irritation caused by the sand, and it adds more and more nacre, forming the pearl. It is easy to see how people hit on the idea of deliberately putting a grain of sand or a small bead inside the oyster and allowing the animals to cover it with nacre, so that the oyster forms what is called a cultured pearl, which although real pearls, are started deliberately.

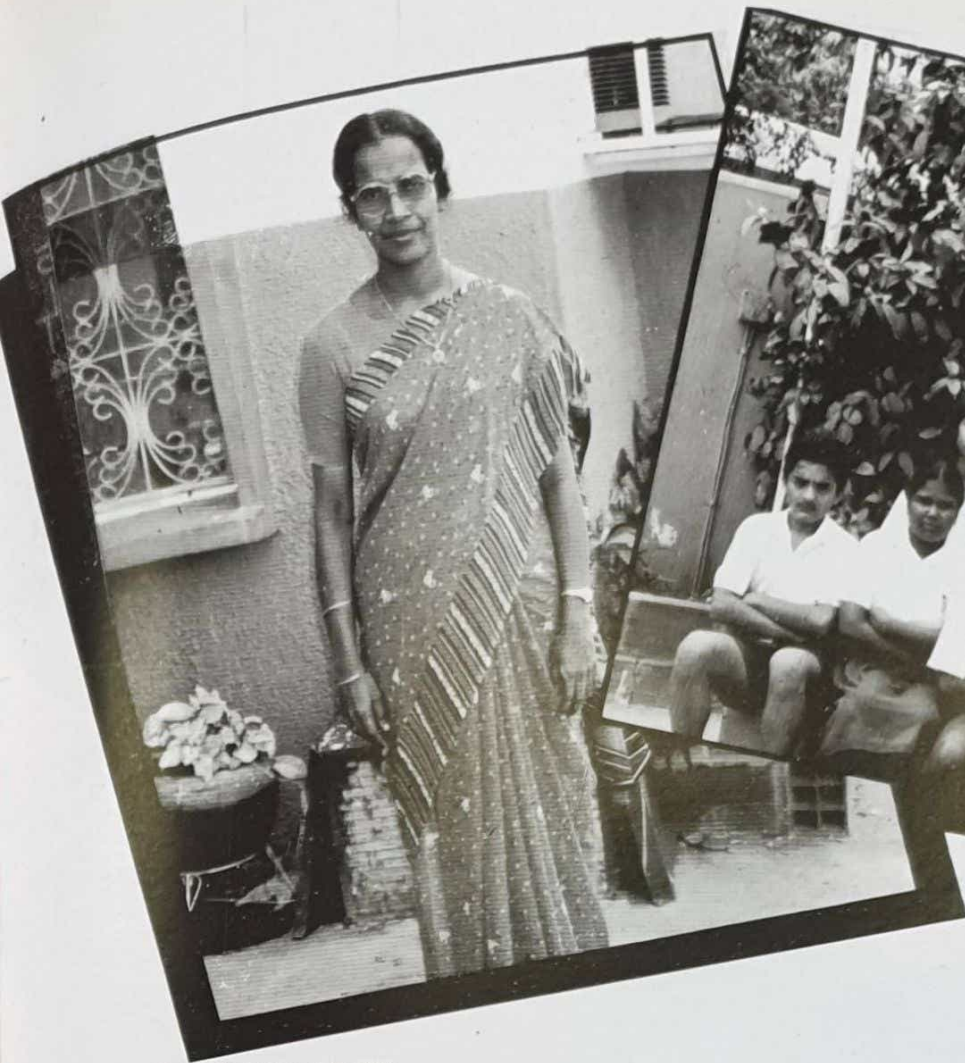
SIR ARTHUR CONAN DOYLE

A LETTER TO YOU

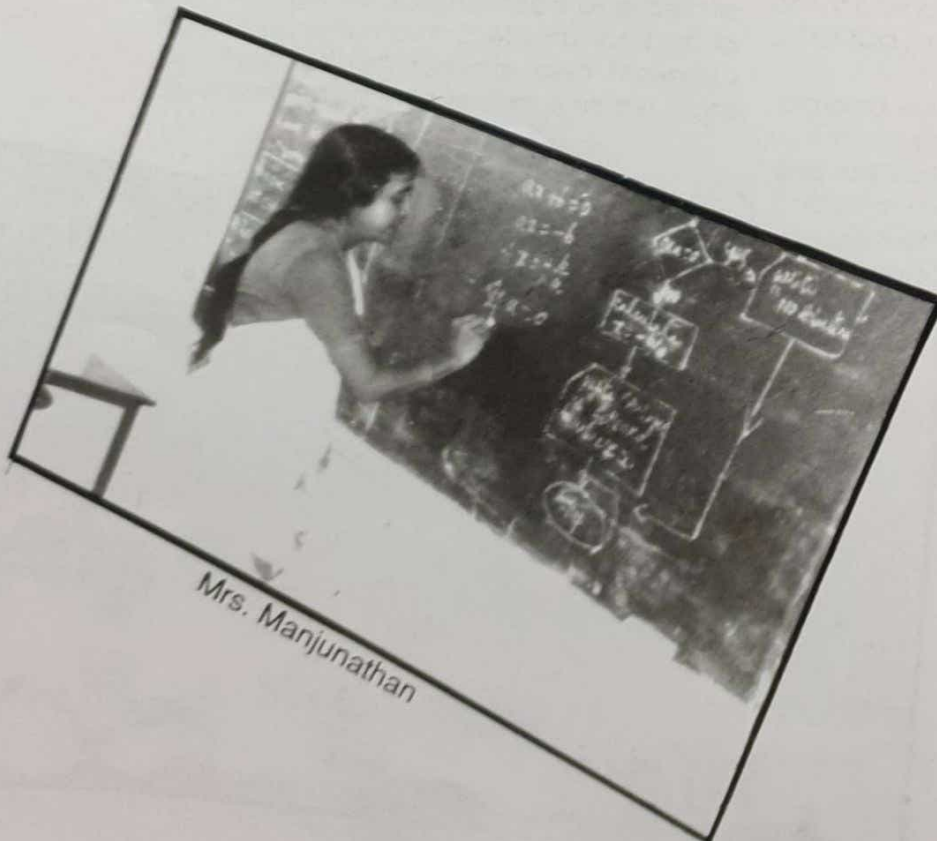
Dear beds, pillows and sheets,

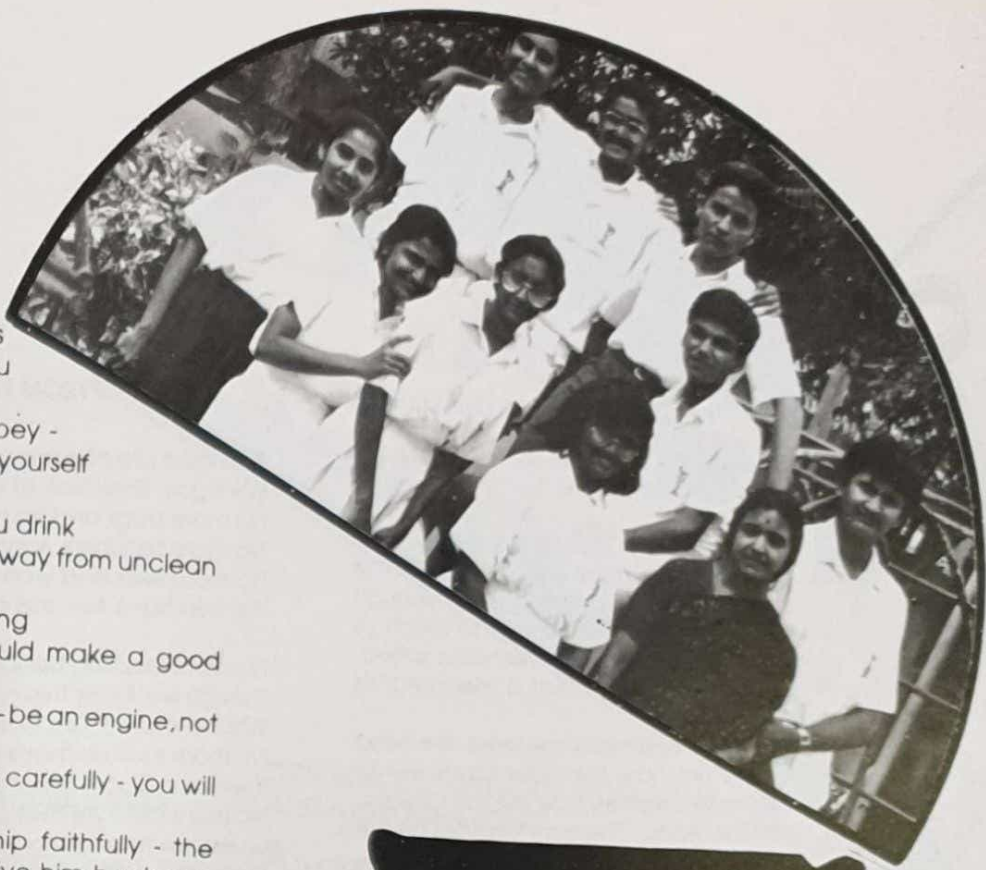

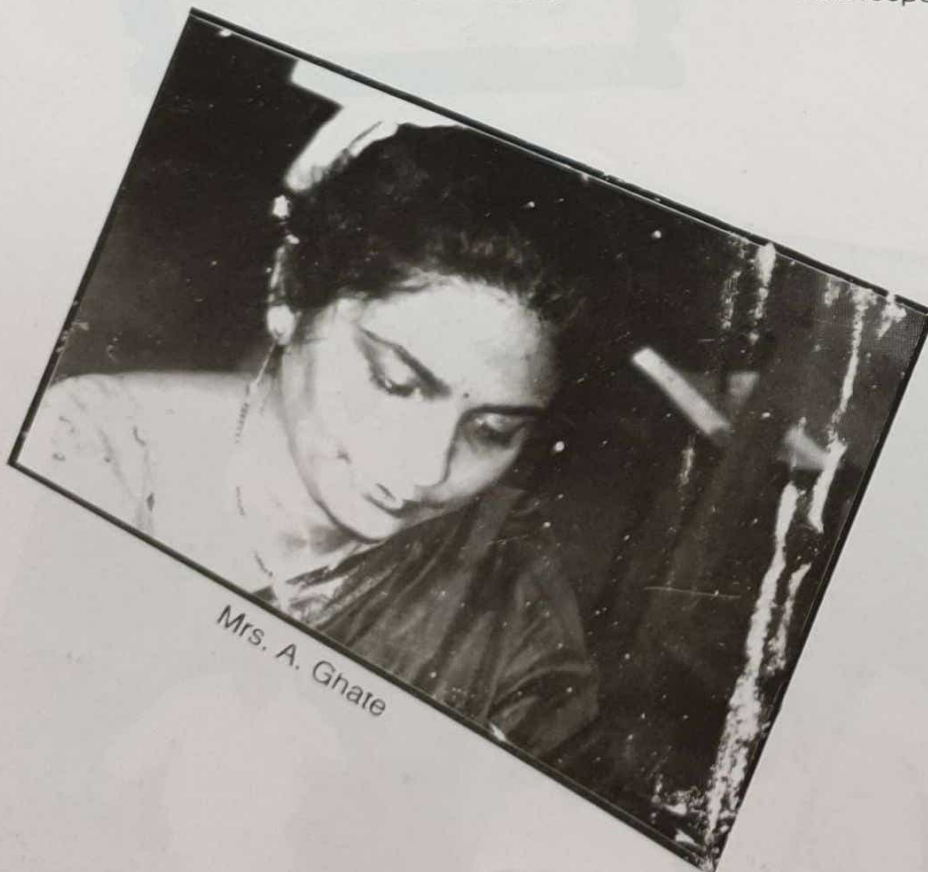

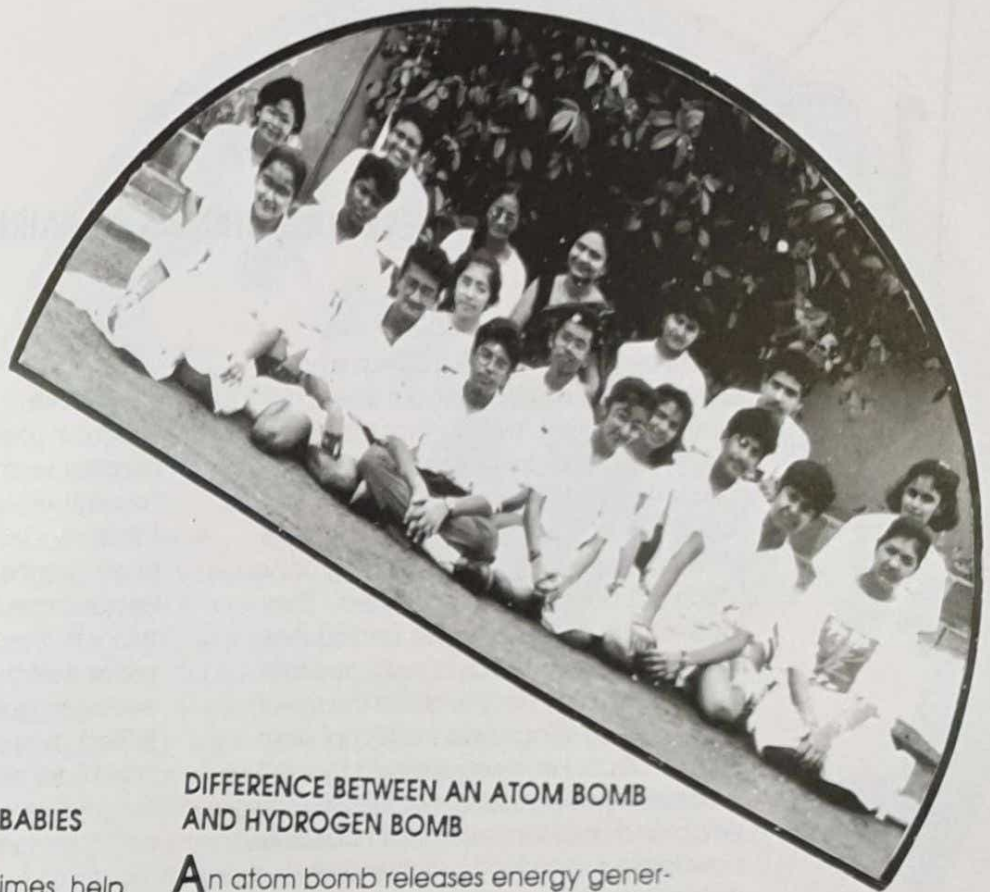

WHAT ARE TEST-TUBE BABIES

Medicine can sometimes help people who cannot have children. If normal fertilization does not occur, doctors fertilize the sperm cell and the ovum outside the mother's body in suitable equipment. The fertilized cell is then placed in the mother's womb to grow normally. These babies are called test-tube babies.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN AN ATOM BOMB AND HYDROGEN BOMB

An atom bomb releases energy generated by the breaking apart of plutonium or uranium nuclei. A hydrogen bomb releases energy created when atoms of an isotope of hydrogen are brought together. It takes an atom bomb to create the conditions to operate a hydrogen bomb, so a fission device is installed to trigger a fusion or thermo-nuclear explosion, duplicating conditions for a fraction of a second similar to those that go on at the centre of our sun.

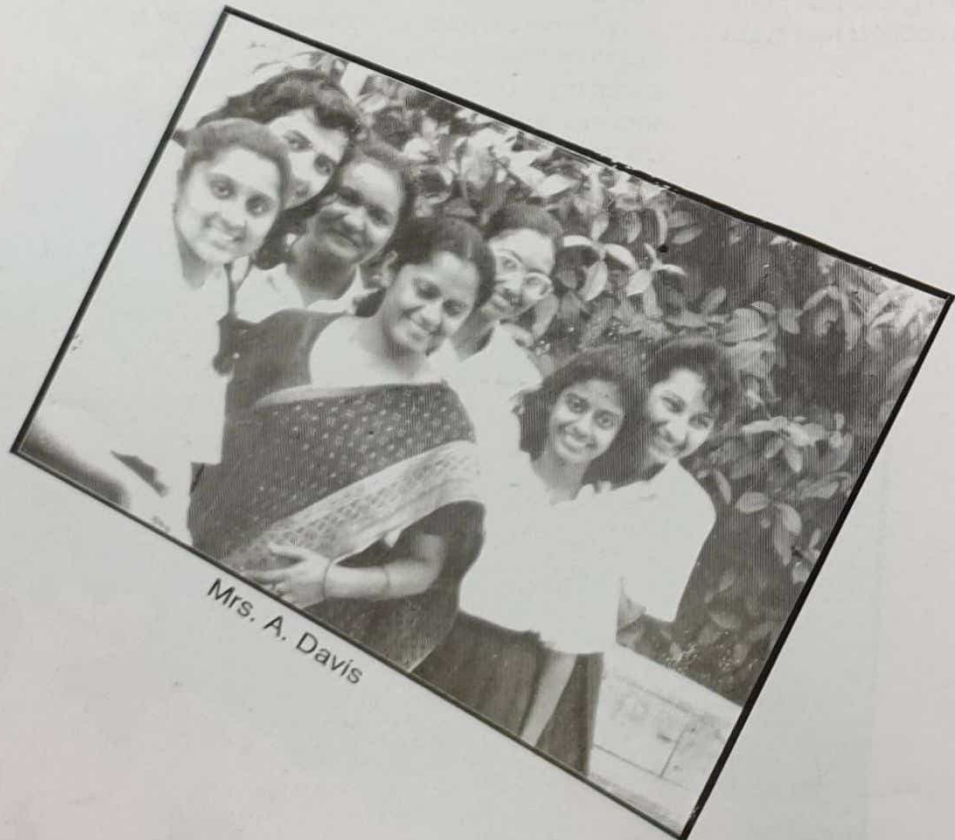

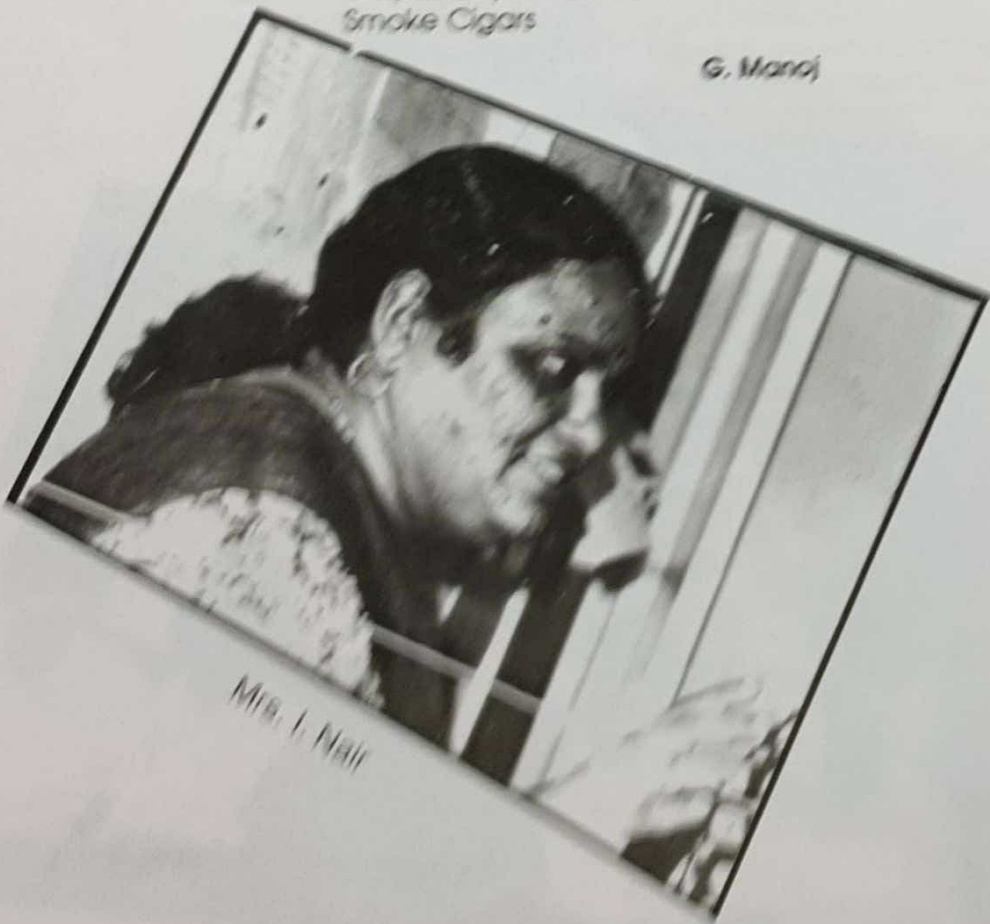

Treatment is very difficult. Prevention rather than cure is recommended, for instance:

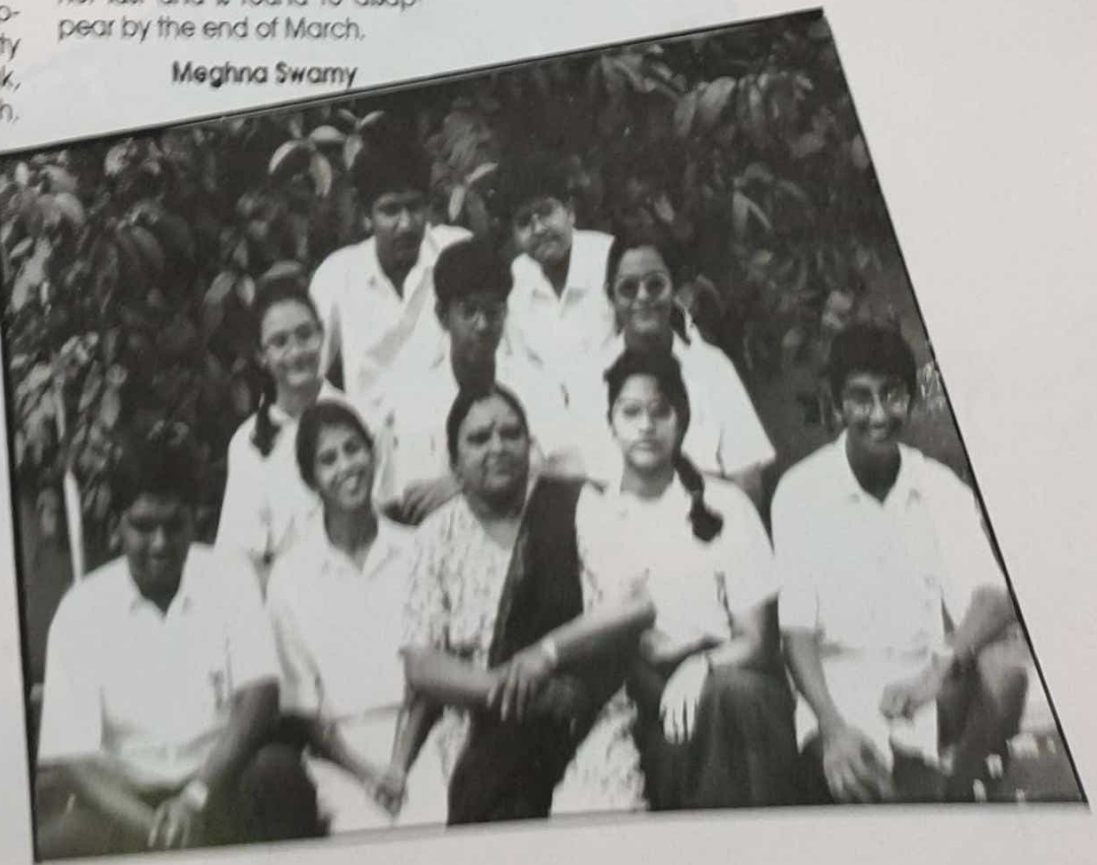
Studying to be phased out over the year as against the high speed cramming just before March.

Studies show that increase on self-confidence and getting over the phobia of poor performances in many subjects can help in checking the fever to a great extent.

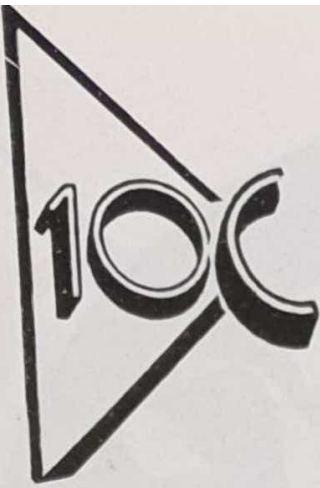
Do not worry, although there is no way you can escape this disease if you enter Grade X, it does not last and is found to disappear by the end of March.

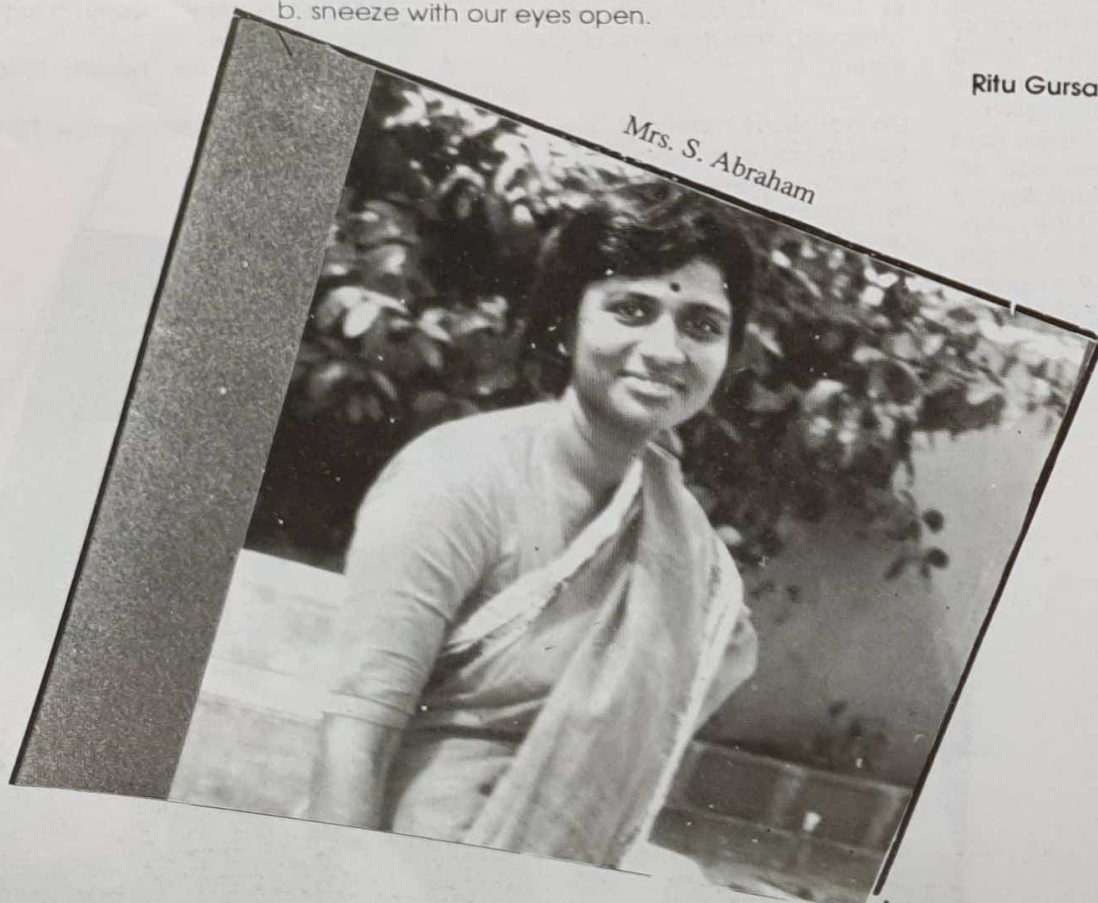

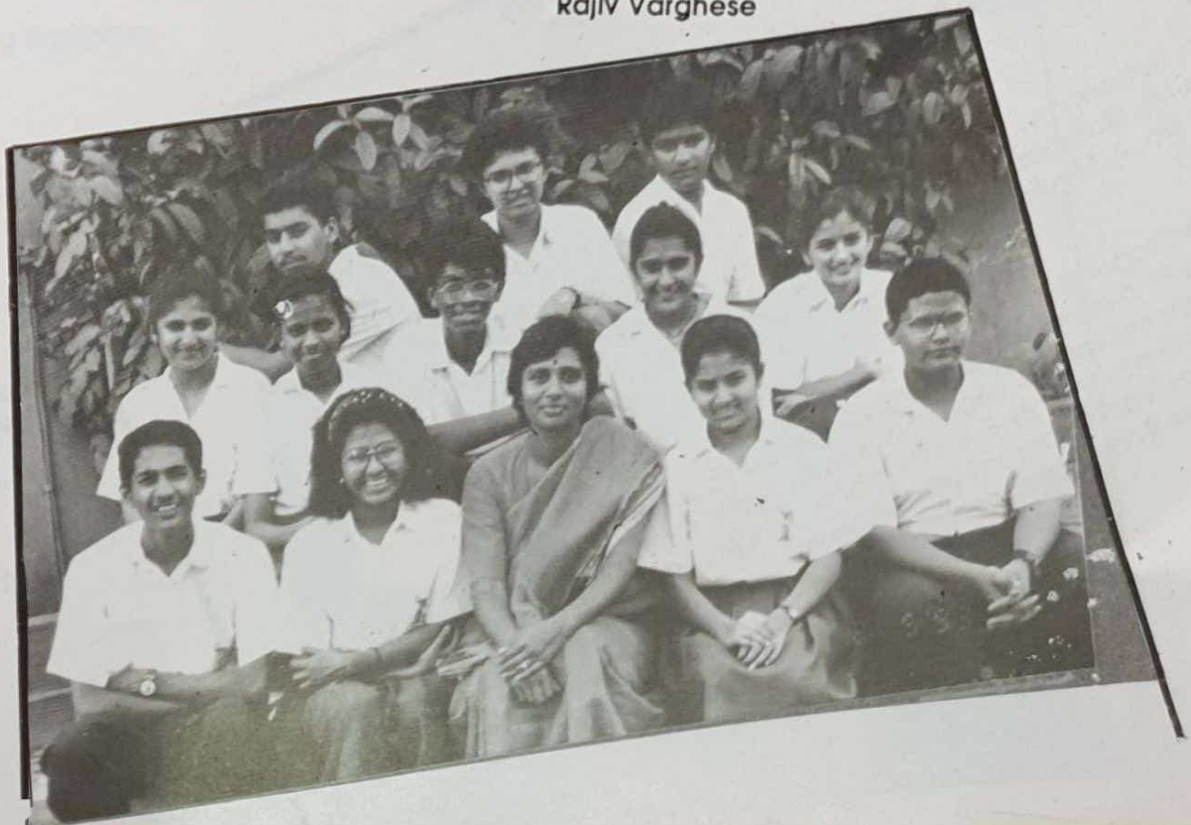


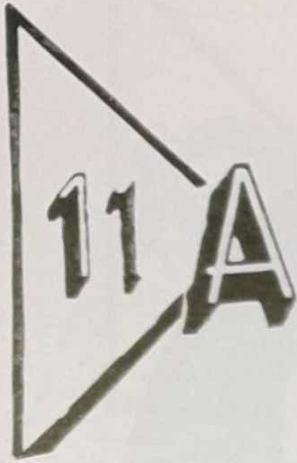
THE BRAZILIAN FOREST

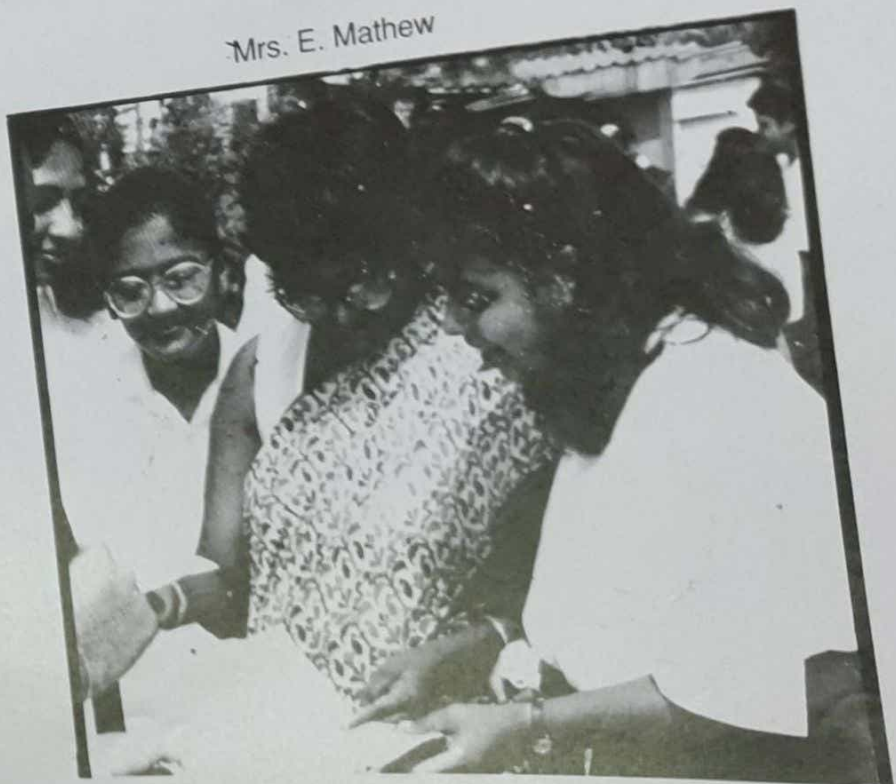
Shyness is also regarded as a natural attribute, a most precious possession of young ladies. Shyness invests them with modesty which gives an extra dimension to their personality.
