Enabling Price Parity and Equitable Distribution Channels for Essential and Life Saving Drugs.

ssential medicines are those that satisfy the priority health care needs of the population. They are intended to be available within the context of functioning health systems at all times in adequate amounts, in the appropriate dosage forms, with assured quality, and at a price the individual and the community can afford.

Access to essential medicines is vital for the health and prosperity of people in developing countries. Prescription for healthy development presents authoritative and in depth strategies for increasing the availability, affordability and appropriate use of medicines in developing countries. Strategies can include providing new incentives for research, better procurement, supply and distribution, strengthened primary health systems, pro-poor planning and budgeting, close collaboration with communities, and large increases in funding and the number of health workers

Target 8e of the Millennium Development Goals acknowledges the need to improve the availability of affordable medicines for the world's poor. Several countries have made substantial progress towards increasing access to essential medicines and treatments to fight HIV/AIDS, malaria and tuberculosis, but access to essential medicines in developing countries is not adequate. The availability of medicines in the public sector is only one third, while private sector availability is about two thirds, and the prices people pay for lowest-priced generic medicines vary from 2.5 times to 6.5 times international reference prices (IRPs) in these two sectors, respectively.

Recent progress in a number of countries shows that access to essential medicines can be improved through stronger partnership among governments, pharmaceutical companies and civil society, including consumers, working together to ensure universal access to essential medicines. The role of pharmaceutical companies, ranging from multinationals to generic manufacturers to national distributors, is critical in this effort.

Since July 2011, 49.1 million Mexicans not affiliated to the Social Security System had been affiliated to the Popular Insurance Scheme. Universal health coverage will be achieved this year, meaning that every Mexican will be guaranteed medical service, medicine and treatment for whenever he needs it. In keeping with these efforts, the mortality rate in children under five fell between 1900 and 2009, from 47.1 to 17.3 deaths for every thousand live births.

Mexico proposes incorporation of distribution of drugs at competitive prices into domestic health care systems. While affordable prices are a key determinant in improving access to medicines, adequate, sustainable and equitable financing of medicines is also required. UNITAID and Advance Market Commitments for vaccines (AMC) are two examples of innovative financing mechanisms that have recently been put in place. UNITAID uses the proceeds of a solidarity tax on airline tickets to purchase drugs and diagnostics for HIV/AIDS, malaria and tuberculosis, while AMC uses donor commitments to provide incentives to vaccine makers to produce vaccines for developing countries.

Mexico calls for transparency in procurement procedures of national health care systems, involving periodic reviews and audits.

Mexico appeals for further liberation of the Doha declaration on TRIP's related agreement licensing and parallel importing do not sufficiently ease pressure on prices

In the light of MDG report 2011 Mexico further proposes a special meet of WTO related to TRIP's agreement on health to make essential drugs available at affordable prices in LDCs.

Mexico draws attention to the urgency of the situation in the light of the battle between a multinational drug producer, NOVARTIS and world's leading producer of generic medicines, India.

Mexico sincerely hopes that the international community will take all possible measures to facilitate generic production of essential drugs.

Mexico emphasizes the significance of increased public sector spending for through health insurance and increase the coverage of national health care system.

Mexico appreciates the stellar work done by voluntary organizations and NGO's in making available life saving drugs especially cancer, and ART drugs in poor countries.

Mexico appreciates and supports UN efforts and those of individuals and organizations in containing epidemics like malaria which is the scourge for Africa.

Mexico exhorts the WHO to set up and international drug bank of essential drugs for LDC's and appeals to the world community, including government pharmaceutical manufactures and civil society, to contribute in terms of funds, medicines, vaccination and medical man power.

## POLICY PAPER PRESENTED AT INMUN 2011

Topic: Japan's Nuclear Crisis & Safeguards of Nuclear Reactors in Disaster Prone Regions.

The heartbreaking scenes of Fukushima nuclear disaster in Japan culminating in a partial release of radioactive nuclear material have been beamed worldwide forcing countries to reassess their own domestic nuclear policies. The Portuguese parliament has unanimously passed a vote of solidarity with the Japanese people and authorities and has sent its condolences to the families of the victims. The effects of this nuclear disaster have spread far beyond the Land of the Rising Sun, forcing the governments promoting nuclear power to assess the use of nuclear power as a source of clean and safe energy for the future. Portugal lays emphasis on ruling out - Nuclear energy and welcomes the initiative of Germany to abandon its dependence on nuclear power by 2020. Portugal has no nuclear power plants and has no plans to build any. It has called for the gradual phase out of Nuclear energy echoing the position of the Greens as 70% of the Portuguese population is against the production of nuclear energy, due to its perceived risks for public health and safety.

Portugal without its own oil, coal or gas and with no expertise in nuclear power, is pitching to lead Europe's clean tech revolution with some of the most ambitious targets and timetables for renewable energy. Its intention is to wean itself off oil and within a decade set up a low carbon economy in response to high oil prices and climate change. In less than 3 decades, Portugal has trebled its hydro power capacity, quadrupled its wind power, and is investing in flagship wave and photovoltaic plants. Portugal's Government also wants to boost hydro output to 8,600MW by 2020 and raise national solar energy production to 1,500 MW. In conjunction to Spain, Portugal has succeeded in creating The Iberian Electricity Market (MIBEL), a joint initiative constructing a regional electricity market, which can be served as an example for the integration of EU energy market. The events in Japan confirm that there is a continuing need to re-evaluate safety and Portugal recognizes the importance of learning from the Fukushima accident and its aftermath. Portugal is fully confident in the ability of Japan to swiftly recover from this crisis and come back stronger, and is determined to draw all necessary lessons from this calamity, including the necessity to promote the highest levels of nuclear safety worldwide. In a synergetic move, Portugal and Spain have also revealed their "permanent information systems and emergency plans" in the event of a nuclear disaster at the Almaraz nuclear power plant located in Spain close to the border between these two countries. Portugal acknowledges that those countries which have chosen to rely on nuclear energy already pay due attention to the safe operation of their nuclear installations and also recognizes that countries may have different approaches regarding the use and contribution of nuclear energy to their energy mix, including the phasing-in or the phasingout. Member countries of EU, have confirmed their willingness to undertake on a voluntary basis comprehensive risks and safety assessment (stress tests), taking into account specifications agreed by European Commission and ENSREG on 24th May 2011. Portugal supports these measures as a member. Portugal is a signatory to number of UN/IAEA conventions such as Convention of Nuclear Safety, CCPM and also urges countries that have not yet done so to ratify the relevant international conventions and treaties adopted under the auspices of the IAEA. Portugal recommends countries to complete periodic review of safety assessments and to carry out assessments at every stage of a nuclear installation's lifetime, establish the relevant infrastructure, with sufficient and qualified human resources, in accordance with IAEA recommendations standards for the construction and operation of nuclear power plants in seismically hazardous areas, as well as in areas that might be otherwise exposed to other external events. Portugal underscores the importance of international cooperation on nuclear safety that will strengthen safety culture worldwide and improve transparency. Portugal strongly believes that countries should do their best to put in place and to implement the highest achievable standards, not only at national, but also at regional and global levels. Portugal exhorts the member states of the UN to support the achievement of MDG goals about Sustainable Development and look for green alternatives to Nuclear power, which can play havoc when stirred with nature's fury.

### INDIAN MODEL UNITED NATIONS CONFERENCE 2011

The year that went by saw ILS take yet another momentous step towards glory by participating in an internationally acclaimed student simulation, the Indian Model United Nations Conference 2010. The participants capitalized on this golden opportunity and took the momentum forward by collaborating with other cager students for INMUN 2011.

Hosted by RYAN INTERNATIONAL SCHOOLS, India, the three day INMUN Conference was held in New Delhi from 2<sup>nd</sup> to 4<sup>th</sup> November 2011. The event this year was on a bigger scale and saw participation from every nook and corner of India, along with representation from South and South East Asia. The I.L.S. was the torch bearer for Africa for the second year running. The Conference saw 800 enthusiastic young minds exercising themselves over complex problems ranging from the roguish behaviour of a nuclear bomb devotee, Iran, to solutions for threatened environs in coastal States of Gulf of Mexicol The arguments, the reactions and the razor sharp responses to veiled criticisms were a treat to behold and hear.

The Conference represented a simulated operation of United Nations and its various organs. The INMUN showcased the working of the three main committees of the General Assembly, the International Maritime Organisation(IMO), the International Atomic Energy Agency(IAEA), the Economic and Social Council(ECOSOC) and of course the all powerful Security Council. For the first time, ILS went with two delegations, representing two nations, Mexico and Portugal; each with a strength of five delegates. Portugal was represented in the first three committees by Kashish Tandon, Pakhuri Bajaj and Vijayta Lalwani respectively. Niranjan Venkataramani wore Portuguese colours in the Security Council while Rucha Deshpande did the honours in IAEA. Mexico had Madhooshri Iyer, Manu Singh and Divya Ramchandani as its representatives in the General Assembly. The Mexican delegate for IMO was Garv Rastogi while Harsh Dayalani served as the Mexican representative in ECOSOC.

The preparations for the Conference began on a war-footing in Lagos and continued till the last session on the last day. These budding diplomats helped each other, negotiated with other delegates at the hotel and the venue and thus lived up to INMUN 2011 motto of SHARE THE WORLD.

All the research work, strategy sessions and backbreaking preparations paid off spectacularly when ILS created a history of sorts by winning the award for Best Country Profile for the second year in a row. Though the trophy was handed over to the Mexicans, yet the contribution of the Portuguese should not be underestimated!
