This was probably the turning point in my career, as 'The Switch' received recognition at two international animation shows in Germany and Japan and was put on you tube by VFS. The school gave me a scholarship and I stayed on in Canada for another six months. I then got a call from a French gaming company, Ubisoft. They said they were putting together a core team for their brand new studio at Singapore, and were interested in my work. I decided to take up their offer as Ubisoft is a veteran company in the industry and one of the world's largest animation companies. I figured I could further my learning and Singapore being a mere five hours from India, was also an attractive prospect.

Presently I work as Associate Lead Animator of the company and the area I deal with is Cinematic Direction or what the French call 'Realization'. This involves directing the Animators to achieve the cinematic quality required for story telling in the Game. I have been with the company for over three years and I have had the privilege of shipping some great titles. I was animator for Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles(Xbox Arcade), Assassins Creed 2and Raving Rabbids, and the Associate Lead Animator for Assassins Creed Brotherhood and Assassins Creed Revelations. At present I am working on an unannounced project. Game development is a difficult process depending heavily on teamwork. So far it has

been a great experience. My wife Ascemta, who is in the same industry also works at Ubisoft.

AMITA MALLYA(SHENAI) (CLASS OF 1997)






of Pharmacy, one of the top ranked pharmacy schools in the nation.

So at the end of my four years at UC San Francisco, not only did I graduate in the top 20% of my class with a Doctorate in Pharmacy, I also honed my interpersonal, professional and leadership skills.

The way that pharmacy is practiced here is quite revolutionary – as pharmacists, we are an integral part of the heath care team giving valuable drug information to clinicians as well as educating patients on their medications. I currently work at a long term care pharmacy. We serve several nursing homes and our population is primarily geriatric. On a daily basis I monitor patient profiles for drug interactions, allergy screenings for all new medications prescribed and provide any drug information that the doctor requests. I also teach classes to the nursing staff giving them an overview of the medications they are administering to their patients. I have been in the work force for a little over three years now and I already see the need for increasing the role of pharmacists in patient care. And this is my long term goal as a clinical pharmacist, to make more hospitals and nursing homes realize that having a pharmacist on board their team is

four walls of ILS that I received the gift of learning and subsequently became inspired to change my corner of the world,"





It has been over 8 years since I graduated from




SHRUTI BAPNA (CLASS OF 2004)





Since my childhood, I had always been fascinated by science, and by my 10" standard, my dream was to join IIT. I had heard a lot about JEE,




throughout the years paved the way for many academic challenges and successes that I have enjoyed. I will always remain grateful to my former teachers for their contribution to my achievements.
